AREA GUIDE NANTWICH

Why is Nantwich called Nantwich?

The old Welsh name was 'Hellath Wen'. Nantwich was an important outpost close to the Welsh border, with a castle near the river Weaver (now recalled in the name 'Castle Street'). The 'Nant' in 'Nantwich' is derived from the Old English 'Namet' (the most famous) or the Welsh 'Nant' (place in a river valley).

Living in Nantwich

Situated on the banks of the River Weaver Nantwich is a vibrant market town and civil parish in Cheshire. It is known for having among the highest concentrations of listed buildings in England, with particularly good examples of Tudor and Georgian architecture. St Mary's Church is in the centre of the town and is considered by some to be one of the finest medieval churches, not only in Cheshire but in the whole of England. Along with the key social amenities and some superb schools Nantwich town centre is bustling with pubs cafes, popular boutique shops and high street retail, not to mention the glorious countryside that surrounds the pretty little town with great country walks perfect for those with dogs or if you enjoy spotting wildlife, peaceful scenery and still lakes then this is the place for you.

Sport and Leisure

Nantwich is a centre of culture with events such as the famous Nantwich Food and Drink Festival, the Jazz and Blues Festival, the Battle of Nantwich and not forgetting the Nantwich Show which is the top one-day agricultural show in the UKwhere the international Cheese Awards takes place and you can enjoy a range of displays, trade stands, Country pursuits and Celebrity chef demonstrations.

Schools in Nantwich

The town has eight sought-after Primary Schools including Millfields, Pear Tree, Highfields and Weaver which have been rated 'Good' by Ofsted and Acton C of E, Stapeley Broad Lane C of E and St Anne's Catholic having 'Outstanding' Ofsted Reports. The two secondary schools both have excellent reputations, Brine Leas school and Sixth Form college and Malbank School and Sixth Form College. Reaseheath college runs further education and higher education courses in conjunction with Harper Adams University and the University of Chester.

Commuting and Transport

Nantwich is linked to Four Major Motorways by the A500 Link Road. Manchester Airport, one of Europe's busiest and fastest developing, is within a 45 minute drive of Nantwich. Frequent trains from Crewe railway station link Cheshire of London Euston in only 1hr 30mins. Manchester and Liverpool offer alternative big city entertainment. Internationally famous football each theatres and concert halls are just some of the many attractions. The ancient city of Chester is only a 45 minute drive.
